# Social Concerns and Outreach



#### **Social Enterprise - Just Life Family Initiative**

There is currently a push for Churches to participate in "social enterprise" as a means to sustain the Church. It has been stated that the Church would be wise to raise 40% of its budget in this way.

A social enterprise is a business designed to achieve specific social objectives as its primary purpose. Social enterprises strive to maximize profits while also maximizing positive impacts on society and the environment. The profits generated are primarily used to fund social programs.

Since November 2023, Trillium Church Council has researched the *Just Life Family* Home Care franchise and held information sessions with the congregation. Karen Atkinson and Council members received feedback and responded to many excellent questions. Between July and December 2024, support for the initiative grew. Several congregants who were not totally sold on the idea, told me they trust our judgment and wished us well.

On December 15<sup>th</sup>, the following motion was passed:

That Trillium Church Council agrees to the purchase of a Just Like Franchise in early 2025. As such, Council:

- 1) Approves the initial investment/ start up costs of \$132,150 to be taken from the Futures Funds.
- 2) Directs the steering committee to recruit members for the management board to take over from the steering committee, the timing of which to be advised by the Just Life Family Central Office. *Management committee members must be approved by Church Council*.
- 3) Acknowledges that Just Life Family views Bobbi Stewart and Karen Atkinson as the key Trillium contacts in conjunction with the Trillium Just Life Family Steering Committee.
- 4) Entrusts the aforementioned to work through the process of the purchase, including, but not limited to, legal appointments regarding the purchase and incorporation.

#### **Ordinary Times**

Here at Trillium we celebrate the seasons of the year with different banners and paraments. A banner celebrating "Ordinary Times" has been hung in the sanctuary. Ordinary Times occurs at two separate times - between Christmas and Lent and then again from Easter to Advent. The second time, the longest, actually covers all of the summer and fall months. Quilts representing Black History month and Remembrance Day have also been hung.

The fabric chosen for this banner gives the impression of water which is mentioned many

times in the Bible representing baptism, salvation, new birth, renewal of life, transcendence.



The Greek word for fish is ICHTHYS meaning Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour. There are 12 fish, one for each of the 12 disciples.

This hand appliqued and hand quilted banner was begun in the summer of 2024 and completed in January of 2025.

Since November 2022, Trillium has hosted the Mobile Food Market, a program offered by the Cambridge Food Bank.

While retail grocery store prices continue to be high, having access to affordable fresh produce is important for many people in our community. By shopping at the Mobile Food Market, you can save 30-40% off retail pricing on a basket of fresh produce.

Baskets are \$10 each. If your basic needs are at risk, you may pay a minimum fee per basket, which is \$5.00, or more.

#### Meals for One - Lasagne soup for one

Prep: 5 minutes mins Cook: 25 minutes mins Total: 30 minutes mins

Enjoy Lasagna Soup, a rich and hearty one-pot meal ready in just 30 minutes. Featuring tender lasagna noodles, a flavorful meat sauce, and melted cheese, this recipe delivers all the comforting flavors of classic lasagna in a simple, satisfying bowl.

#### **Ingredients**

2 lasagna noodles1 tablespoon olive oil

½ cup chopped onions 1 clove garlic -minced

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> pound ground beef (4 ounces)

1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes or chili

flakes

1/4 teaspoon dried oregano

1/8 teaspoon salt

½ tablespoon tomato paste

½ cup tomato sauce

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup chicken broth

½ cup heavy cream

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup shredded Parmesan cheese

½ cup shredded mozzarella cheese

1 tablespoon ricotta cheese



#### **Instructions**

Cook the Lasagna Noodles: Break the lasagna noodles into smaller pieces and cook them in a 2-quart saucepan according to package directions. Drain and set aside. Slightly undercook the noodles to prevent them from becoming too soft as they will continue to cook in the soup.

**Toss Noodles in Olive Oil:** Lightly toss the drained noodles with 1 teaspoon of olive oil in a bowl to prevent sticking.

**Sauté the Onions:** Heat olive oil in the same saucepan over medium heat. Add the chopped onions and sauté for about 2 minutes, stirring occasionally, until translucent.

Add Garlic: Stir in the minced garlic and sauté for 30 seconds, stirring frequently to prevent burning.

Cook the Ground Beef: Add the ground beef to the pot. Break it into smaller pieces with a spatula and season with red pepper flakes, oregano, and salt. Cook until browned, about 3 minutes.

**Stir in Tomato Paste and Sauce:** Add the tomato paste and stir for 30 seconds. Pour in the tomato sauce and chicken broth, then bring the mixture to a light simmer.

**Add Heavy Cream:** Pour in the heavy cream and bring the mixture to a brief boil, stirring occasionally.

**Combine Noodles and Cheese:** Return the cooked lasagna noodles to the pot. Stir in Parmesan and mozzarella cheeses until melted and fully incorporated.

**Serve:** Ladle the soup into a bowl and top with a dollop of ricotta cheese

### **Pastor Mark's Musings**

Dear Friends,

I noticed that Sir. John A MacDonald's statue at Queens Park is still boarded up. It has now been almost five years since it was encased in a plywood box. It seems that the province can't decide what to do with it. Should the statue be removed to another location or should it be restored from previous vandalism? What would you do if you were the premier of Ontario?

Personally, I would restore the statue and allow it to stand at its current location. I understand that for some this would be a personal affront to their sense of justice. It seems to me that there are several issues of principle that we need to promote as a society if we want to be a truly welcoming and inclusive community.

- 1. **Respect for the past.** We need to honour our forebears for the good they did. There is no question that we owe a great deal of today's Canada to MacDonald. Without his vision and drive it is possible that Canada would not even exist. In fact, what we have in 2025 rests on the incredible vision and dedication of so many who have come before us.
- 2. **People are complex.** Often people have mixed motives for what they do. That is certainly true of our first prime minister. He was not a perfect person and he certainly made many mistakes. Honouring someone from the past does not condone their mistakes but situates their life at the fulcrum of human experience. With every person we take the good with the bad.
- 3. The past is easily scapegoated. People from the past are the most vulnerable to scapegoating because they cannot speak for themselves or defend their legacy. I think the most egregious example of this is how Egerton Ryerson has been treated over the past few years. He was the architect of public education in Ontario and was a great humanitarian. His record with respect to residential schools has been unfairly distorted. Who speaks for his legacy?

- 4. **Modern snobbery.** There is a certain hubris that accompanies a lot of the current critique of the past. The assumption is that had we lived in their times and in their circumstances we would have made better choices than they did. How do we know this is true? All people are a product of their time and that truth includes us. We are all sinners before the reality of love and we have all sinned against our neighbour. I see no moral superiority in my generation over those who lived several generations before us.
- 5. Living into the disagreement. I can imagine some at Trillium disagreeing with what I am writing. Can we agree to disagree on this without losing our goodwill for each other? I find the kind activism that defaces statues offensive because a small group of activists take it upon themselves to speak for the whole community. Where did this mandate come from? I didn't agree to this. Did you?

You will notice no mention of God or Jesus so far. And yet it seems to me that what I am speaking about goes to the heart of what it means to follow Jesus. To follow Christ is to show reverence for our past, a willingness to take into account the full person before us whoever they might be, a commitment to refrain from scapegoating people for any reason, an alertness to our own pride in our endeavours with others and a commitment to seeking the higher ground when we disagree with each other.

If we live this way, we are living out many aspects of what Jesus calls us to do.
