

Meet Loko

As many of you know, Trillium sponsored a refugee family from Ethiopia, that arrived this spring. We would like to introduce you to one member of the family, a remarkable 25 year old woman named Loko. Loko is one of two young adults in the family, which also includes her mother, brother and four teens who are her niece and nephews. Her family came originally from Ethiopia, but was torn apart by violence in that country and fled to Uganda for safety. Loko and her family are settling into life here in Cambridge. Loko's English is quite good and she is taking courses to get her high school diploma so she can study at college level, all while working full-time and caring for her nephews and mother. Those of us who have gotten to know her, have been extremely impressed with her work ethic, determination, organization and all with such grace and good humour! We asked her some questions to help everyone get to know her better.



What was your life like in Uganda before you came to Canada?

Our house was just two rooms: We slept on mattresses on the floor. Our kitchen was outside and it had a roof but no walls. I couldn't work because I stayed home to help with the children. I was teaching them at home because it was too expensive for them to go to school. We speak Oromo but in Uganda we learned English. Many people in Ethiopia also speak Amharic. I can understand it but don't speak it well.

What were your impressions when you first arrived in Canada? How did you feel?

I was so excited and so happy! It was a long wait, 9 years! The cities are very different. The roads here are so good and smooth, and it's so clean. In Kampala it's very busy, with lots of motorcycles, which drive everywhere. It felt strange to wait for a red light in Canada even if no one is coming.

What did you find hard to get used to here?

Food is packed very differently. We buy rice or sugar in really big packages but now I know how it works. We would go to a butcher to get meat, and you see the meat, a full goat or cow. It's not in small packages. We missed injera (a kind of flatbread that is a staple in Ethiopia) but now we found we can buy it sometimes in an Ethiopian store in Kitchener.

What do you like best about Canada?

I like everything! I like that it is peaceful, we can get an education and I am able to work. I think more good things will come but I will have to work hard for it. I'm just hoping that everyone will succeed at their studies and be able to work to have enough money for food and rent.

A day in the life of Loko: Can you describe what you do in a day?

I wake up at 5 to prepare, take a bus at 6:20, take another bus at 7 to get to work for 7:30. I work at Snackruptus (a cracker manufacturer) on an assembly line. It moves fast. We change jobs every 30 minutes. At first I was very tired but now I am used to it. Work is done at 3:30 but I don't get home until 4:30 or later. The bus connections mean a lot of waiting. My sister (Loko thinks of her niece, Fartu as a sister) helps me because she does the cooking. We make a lot at once for more than one meal. In the evening, there are a lot of forms to fill out for the boys in school and for the doctors. I have a lot of reading and assignments for my course.

A Health Update on Loko's Family:

During the summer the family's support team has had to take some family members to medical appointments at walk in clinics. Two members of the family have also had appointments for eye conditions. We were fortunate to have Langs Medical Clinic accept them as patients when they received their health cards at the end of August. They are presently waiting for their first orientation appointment.

Each family member was also seen by a dentist over the course of the last four months. Basic cleaning and fillings were completed. Unfortunately, four family members need the services of a dental specialist. This is not covered by their emergency plan with the government. We anticipate that it will be very expensive. It was not anticipated or budgeted for in the original fundraising plan for the family.

We very much need monetary help from the congregation to cover these costs and have decided to ask for donations through Trillium's Special Thanksgiving Offering. Any help that you are able to give to Loko's family will be appreciated.

The Team continues to organize clinics offering personal care to Trillium members and the community at large. All clinics are managed by volunteers.

Personal Care Clinics - Pay as you can

On September 10, the Team hosted a Personal Care Clinic at 565 Margaret Street apartment building offering therapeutic foot care and hair cuts. Residents also readily accessed free Wellness Checks. There is a consistent clientele at this location including many whose lack of mobility makes it difficult for them to otherwise access personal care services.

Funding for these clinics comes from the Upfund (Western Ontario Waterways Region), fundraising at Trillium (Garage Sale, Pie bakers, UCW, Beef Supper) and private donations.

Massage Clinics - FREE

On September 19, the Team hosted the first Massage Clinic featuring Conestoga College Massage Therapy Students.

Five third-year students offered free massages to benefit twenty-three people. This clinic was open to anyone. Participants included several Trillium members and staff and contacts established through Personal Care Clinics. Participants had the option for service on a massage bed or a massage chair. Feedback from participants was positive. Sally White,



Parish Nurse, was on hand to offer Wellness Checks. As with all clinics, refreshments (coffee, tea, muffins, cookies) were available. Thanks to Carol Fleet.




Since November 2022, Trillium has hosted the Mobile Food Market, a program offered by the Cambridge Food Bank.

While retail grocery store prices continue to be high, having access to affordable fresh produce is important for many people in our community. By shopping at the Mobile Food Market, you can save 30-40% off retail pricing on a basket of fresh produce.

Baskets are \$10 each. If your basic needs are at risk, you may pay a minimum fee per basket, which is \$5.00, or more.

Everyone is welcome. You can support the program by paying more than the suggested price.



Pastor Mark's Musings

Dear Friends.

As I am writing this Musing of the October Roots and Sprouts the MLB playoffs have begun. The first four games take place today. The playoff game that interests Toronto Blue Jays fans the most is the Yankees/Red Sox matchup in New York City because the winner of that series will face the Blue Jays in round two. For the first time ever, the Yankees will block out-of-market fans from buying postseason tickets. In simple terms, they are not going to allow Red Sox fans to attend any of the games in NYC.

I was listening to Mike Francesa, a radio sports commentator from NYC, decrying this move by the Yankees on his show recently. Understand, Francesa is a passionate Yankees fan but he believes it is simply small-minded and petty to deny Boston fans a chance to see the game live at Yankee Stadium. He said, "we are the New York Yankees, the mighty Yankees. We are the franchise or franchises. We are going to run afraid of another team's fans?" He was lamenting that the Yankees were now acting like a second rate, scared franchise that has to block fans from Boston from seeing the game live. "Say it ain't so that the Yankees have stooped to such a ploy."

I suppose the Yankees' management doesn't want any Red Sox fans cheering for their team in Yankee Stadium. The Yankees' management only wants to hear one voice speaking, the deafening cheers for their team. The way to make this happen is to simply make it impossible for Red Sox fans to attend.

I wish this sentiment were only found in post season sports events but I am afraid that this mind set has infected pretty much every facet of our culture today. The tendency today is to insist on only one perspective or one point of view. Just watch cable news and see how this sounds. Sometimes you'll hear a token presentation of a different point of view being represented but it is just that, a token. It is not a serious offering. People often straw-man each other's point of view over simplifying it to the point of it being a caricature of what that person really believes. Or people will try to smear a different point of view by labeling it with an offensive nickname. "Climate Change Denier" or "Climate Change Alarmist" comes to mind.

I think that the maturity of a culture is represented by its ability to tolerate and perhaps even celebrate a wide spectrum of voices. A plurality of voices is a good thing and it is important that we create the space for a wide exchange of ideas. Unfortunately, it seems that today we have many who think that the key to progress is to be like the Yankees and simply deny or frustrate those voices that are in opposition to our own. Every struggle then becomes a political confrontation to see who's voice triumphs.

Jesus, when talking to a large crowd, said "You've been taught to love your neighbour and hate your enemy. Paraphrase, "You've been taught to love those who agree with you and hate those who disagree with you." Jesus goes on to say:

But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven. He causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous. If you love those who love you, what reward will you get? Are not even the tax collectors doing that? And if you greet only your own people, what are you doing more than others? Do not even pagans do that? Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect. Matthew 5:44-48

If we only seek friendship with those who agree with us, what good are we? If we seek companionship only with those who understand the world the way we do, what great prize do we deserve? If we will only have fellowship with those who embrace the causes that matter to us, what are we doing more than others?

What do you think about Trillium being an ideologically diverse community? For me I wonder where else are people with differing points of view ever going to meet up with each other but at church? On the street? I hope not. There is a certain responsibility that comes when we embrace our diversity. At times it might mean Trillium staying neutral on a topic in a way that you might find difficult to live with. But the blessing of staying open and wide is that we will learn how to live Jesus' injunction to love our neighbour and "our enemy" with equal passion. And that is a lesson our world desperately needs to learn.
